#### Matthew - Gospel of the Church

When we have a complicated diagram to reproduce, as in the human body for example, we might start with a series of sheets of tracing paper. The first might be a drawing of the human skeleton and then on top of that, using the same scale, we might impose other drawings on tracing paper representing the muscles, the various organs and so on. In this way we can look at each drawing separately, or if we wish, see them superimposed on each other. Our modern computers can achieve such individual and also combined revelations in a fascinating way.

We can do something similar with the Gospels.

The portrait of Jesus of Nazareth that the disciples held in their memories might be a first layer. But then on top of this the disciples superimposed features of the Risen Jesus that they began to experience after Easter, the amazing presence of the Risen Lord that was in their communities.

In St Matthews Gospel, we are never quite sure whether we are beside Lake Tiberias in the year 30 or at a celebration of the Eucharist in a Christian Church on the 80s. Matthew puts us in two places at the same time. He deliberately places upon the Jesus of history the tracing paper of the Lord living in the church. So the Jesus it portrays is seen through the glorious features of the Risen Lord as celebrated by the church and its liturgy.

St Matthew's Gospel is the Church's Gospel. It is the only one of the four Gospels that specifically uses the word 'church'. It is concerned with the church's organisation, with its community life and with its teaching, outlined in five great speeches. It introduces us to the heart of a church which celebrates its Lord in liturgy, cries 'Lord save us' in life's storms but also runs the risk of stifling itself and having only 'little faith'.

In reading St Matthew's Gospel three features of the Church communities it addressed might be noticed. Firstly, it is composed mainly of Christians who had come from Judaism. Secondly, they are in conflict with official Judaism. And thirdly, these communities are open to receiving Gentiles, witnessing Jesus' call to send his disciples to the whole world.

We invite parents to prepare for this Mass by sharing pages 18 and 19 of Thumb with their child as well as the four pages of Grapevine 5. I hope you're managing to save all these copies of Grapevine. There will be nine in all with lots of information to help our preparation in this important year. You'll find the Gospel for next Sunday's Mass in Grapevine 5 just as the Gospel for our last Mass was in Grapevine 4.
