# Sunday 15th July 2018

'Make hospitality your special care'.

These words of Paul to the young Christian community in Rome commend themselves to us as we approach the world meeting of families next month. With people coming to us from around the world it is an occasion for a warm welcome and hospitality.

A group arriving from Australia are anxious to celebrate the Eucharist in our Church on the evening of their arrival, August 19<sup>th</sup>. On Fri, Aug 24<sup>th</sup>, at the end of the conference in the RDS, we will be host to up to 250 pilgrims from Pakistan. The Parish Pastoral Council this Monday evening will give thought to that event at our church and to its planning.

The Church in Pakistan recently welcomed the joyful news that the Archbishop of Karachi, Joseph Coutts, was to become the 2<sup>nd</sup> Cardinal ever in Pakistan. In a country of 208 million over 95% of its population is Muslim and Christians represent 2% of the population. The church in Pakistan, as in Ireland, lives in the liturgical and pastoral life of its parishes; runs schools and hospitals that are open to all, has in 'Caritas Pakistan' the charity to meet emergency and tragedy just like 'Trocaire' in Ireland. In other respects it's different.

The rise of militant groups like Al Qaeda, the Taliban and Isis, in recent years, impacts heavily on the day to day life of their community. We

have become used to news of atrocities like the terrorist attack on a Methodist Church in Quetta last Christmas, with 16 killed and many injured. The State in trying to uphold freedom of worship offers police protection at places of worship but the new waves of terror and the tendency to abuse the law to settle old scores leaves people vulnerable and afraid.

In March, a 34 year old Catholic father was killed by doctors and security staff in a State run hospital in Lahore after he complained that a lady doctor had smacked his heavily pregnant sister. On April 2<sup>nd</sup> in Quetta, four members of a Catholic family were killed in a targeted gun attack.

Later, on April 27<sup>th</sup>, the plight of death row prisoner, and 53 year old mother of four, Asia Bibi, received worldwide attention when she invited a day of fasting and prayer for her release. Four Muslim women and an imam accused her of blaspheming against Muhammed in 2009, a charge she vehemently denied. Sentenced to death in 2010 she hopes for a successful access to the Appeals Court but it's not assured. It all arose out of a row about the sharing of a bowl of water with fellow workers.

Human rights groups claim that the blasphemy law in Pakistan is often misused to settle old scores and that muslims are also frequent victims of the practice. Life is not easy for a Christian in Pakistan and in many other countries around the world.

We're honoured to be asked to host our visitors on a Friday night in August. Let's give them warm welcome and hospitality.

# **Celebrating Baptism**

Our next meeting in preparation for Baptisms to be celebrated in August will be held on Monday,  $30^{\text{th}}$  July, at 8pm in the Parish Meeting Room.

The celebrations of Baptism in August will be on Sunday August 5<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup>, after the 12 noon Mass.

Parents are asked to please register with the Parish Office in advance of Monday 30<sup>th</sup> July and to attend the preparatory meeting.

Because it occasionally arises as a question, we confirm that godmother and godfather should be of each gender and that godparents must be over 16 and practising Catholics, at home in their faith. While normally we have two godparents, it is sufficient to have just one. Another may act as a witness rather than a godparent in that situation.

#### **General Data Protection Regulation**

A new European Data Protection law, the General Data Protection Regulation ("GDPR"), was introduced on 25<sup>th</sup> May 2018. This new law applies to any organisation, including our parish that manages and processes people's personal information. We are now working on

ways of ensuring that what we do with your information is compliant with this new law. It is a work in progress and over the next few months we will keep you informed through the parish website and in the newsletter as policies are put in place.
