Renewing Services

Most parishes saw their services seriously affected by Covid. Our attendances remain somewhere between a third and a half of what they were before Covid came and locally services such as the shop, ministry to the sick, as well as Eucharistic and Word ministry have been constrained or suspended.

We hope, with the members of the Parish Pastoral Council, to rebuild in the early Autumn. So people might give thought now to the possibilities of joining a parish ministry- as Readers, Eucharistic ministers, Collectors, assistants on the shop area, membership of choirs, etc.

We have already issued invitations to the housebound to let us know if they wish to be visited with Holy Communion or opportunity to celebrate God's forgiveness in Reconciliation. Covid remains a reality and we don't wish to impose on anyone while it is so.

Others might give thought to membership of the Bethany Bereavement group, following training in Autumn. We have issued invitations to teenagers and potential animators who might like to participate in the **Laudato Si' award** recently announced by the diocese. We invited also in recent weeks any interest there may be in a group from the parish going with the diocesan **pilgrimage to Lourdes** in September (see notice board), or a young person's group engaging with the diocese in preparation for the World Youth Gathering in Lisbon in August 2023. Let us know if any of these opportunities interest you. At another level, September will see the beginning of **courses affording a deepening of faith**. We mentioned a number of these in recent weeks also and this may be the time to give serious consideration to taking on such a challenge. Among those we highlighted were **Pathways; Exploring Faith and Ministry** (Thursday nights in St. Pat's Campus, Drumcondra), or a couple of Courses offered by DCU for which scholarship assistance was available.

<u>Tap and Go in June</u>

During the month of June, the Tap and Go machine in our parish collected €2,330 from 173 transactions. This is split 60%to the Common Fund and 40% to Share. Now that we have resumed passing the baskets for these two collections at Sundays Masses, take on board that if someone uses the Tap and Go device to donate, they're not expected to donate again when the basket comes round. The person who passes the basket and doesn't put anything in may well have given very generously already. Let them feel very comfortable in doing so.

Venerable Mary Aikenhead's Day-next Friday

The Sisters of Charity have very kindly left material at the back of the Church relating to Mother Mary Aikenhead, their founder. You are welcome to avail of the prayer cards and novena prayer and other informative literature on the life of Mary Aikenhead.

Cholera hit this area of the city, Irishtown especially, in the early 1830s and it was Sisters of Charity who led the hard and dangerous work of attending to victims and protecting the population at the time. It's a chapter of Dublin history that should never be forgotten especially in our parish. Next Friday, July 22nd is Mary Aikenhead Day. Her submission letter to the Commissioners of Inquiry into the condition of the Poor in Dec 1833 is a classic description of the appalling state of poor people in Sandymount, Irishtown, Ringsend and Donnybrook at the time. Their Convent was established on Sandymount Ave three years earlier with a commitment 'to be ever ready to lend our humble assistance to those works of mercy which may tend to alleviate the sufferings of our fellow creatures of every creed'. In 1834 Mary Aikenhead opened St Vincent's Hospital, the first hospital in Ireland to be run by women 'for people of all creeds'. Previously her nuns had become the first to visit prisoners in Kilmainham Jail and she had opened a school for poor children in Gardiner Street. When our church was built in 1853 it was known as Irishtown Church until 1876. In that same year the sisters of Charity moved to Lakelands, which had been the home of Carmelites sisters until then. Mother Mary Aikenhead died in Harold's Cross on the 22nd July 1858. In 2015 she was one of seven persons declared venerable by Pope Francis. She and her sisters are worthy of our gratitude and admiration of their powerful witness.
